

Dr. Alan Sangster is Professor (cadetratico) of Accounting Education at Middlesex University Business School, London and a visiting professor at the University of Wales, Newport. He is a qualified chartered accountant and holds a bachelor degree in business studies, a master degree in operational research, and a doctorate in accounting education. He is also a qualified teacher of English to speakers of other languages and is fluent in (not so good!) Portuguese. After obtaining his bachelor degree he spent some years in accounting practice and then working in industry. He has been a professor since 1983, has held a chair since 1996 and has worked in seven different UK universities, including the Open University where he devised, wrote and ran the 60-credit 1,000 student distributed learning course, the Certificate in Accounting. He has been head of department in two universities and, for 10 years, he was editor of the *International Journal of Applied Expert Systems*. For many years he has been an associate editor of *Accounting Education, an international journal*; and he has served on the editorial board of more than 10 journals. He has published over 40 academic papers in refereed journals, presented his work at over 70 conferences from Brazil to Hong Kong, and is the author of a number of books, including the best selling financial accounting textbook outside North America, *Frank Wood's Business Accounting*. He is a past chair of the British Accounting Association Special Interest Group in Accounting Education (BAA AE SIG) and of the American Accounting Association Artificial Intelligence/Expert Systems (AI/ES) Section. His work has been recognised by the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Ireland, the AI/ES Section of the AAA and, most recently, by the BAA AE SIG and by the Spanish Association of Accounting and Business Administration. He is a former member of both the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Scotland IT Committee and the IT Committee of the umbrella body for the 6 main UK professional accountancy bodies, the CCAB. His current research interests lie in education, emerging technologies, and in accounting history: specifically, the works of Luca Pacioli, the father of accounting, on which topic he has published four papers in academic journals and has another forthcoming in 2010.
